

# Children's Defense Fund Child Poverty in the States: 2011



September 2012

The U.S. Census Bureau released new poverty data for the states that show families still struggling in the wake of the Great Recession. There were statistically significant increases in the rates of child poverty between 2010 and 2011 in 14 states, and slight increases in 26 others. Only nine states and the District of Columbia saw some small decline in their rates of children living in poverty in 2011. In South Dakota, the rate did not change.

The 14 states with statistically significant increases include:

## Child Poverty

- More than one in five children were poor in over half (26) the states and the District of Columbia in 2011, and in half of these states more than one in four children were poor.
- More than one in four children under six were poor in 21 states and the District of Columbia.

- Thirteen states plus the District of Columbia had child poverty rates of 25 percent or higher:
  - Mississippi: 31.8%
  - New Mexico: 30.7
  - District of Columbia: 30.3
  - Louisiana: 28.8
  - Arkansas: 28.1
  - South Carolina: 27.8
  - Alabama: 27.6
  - Kentucky: 27.4
  - Arizona: 27.2
  - Texas: 26.6
  - Georgia: 26.3
  - Tennessee: 26.3
  - West Virginia: 25.8
  - North Carolina: 25.6
  
- No state had a poverty rate lower than 12 percent in 2011. (Only New Hampshire had a child poverty rate of 10 percent or lower in 2010. It was 12 percent in 2011.)
  
- More than half of all poor children lived in eight states in 2011:

### **Extreme Child Poverty**

- In a third of the states and the District of Columbia, more than 10 percent of the children lived in extreme poverty – at half or less of the poverty level.
  
- In 30 states and the District of Columbia, ten percent or more of poor young children under six lived in extreme poverty.
  
- More than half of all children in extreme poverty lived in eight states in 2011.

## Children of Color

- In half the states and the District of Columbia, at least 40 percent of Black children were poor. In 32 states, at least 33 percent of Hispanic children were poor.
- Black and Hispanic children are far more likely to be poor than White children. Almost two in five Black children and one in three Hispanic children were poor in 2011; more than one in eight White, Non-Hispanic children were poor.
- The five states with the highest poverty rates for Black children were:
  - Iowa: 55.7%
  - Maine: 52.8
  - Ohio: 50.5
  - Michigan: 50.0
  - Mississippi: 49.6
- The six (because there is a tie for fifth) states with the highest poverty rates for Hispanic children were:
  - Alabama: 47.8%
  - North Carolina: 43.6
  - Pennsylvania: 42.9
  - South Carolina: 42.8
  - Arkansas: 42.7
  - Indiana: 42.7
- The five states with the highest poverty rates for White, Non-Hispanic children were:
  - West Virginia: 24.4%
  - Kentucky: 3.9
  - Arkansas: 20.0
  - Tennessee: 19.6
  - Oregon: 19.1
